It can result in pain commonly associated with lameness, muscle atrophy and poor limb function as a result of dynamic joint instability. During this presentation we will cover the following key points: Discuss the effect that cranial cruciate disease has on the joints structure, motion and function Actors that might predispose a patient to bilateral cranial cruciate disease Should stifle orthotics be factored into our management plan Biomechanical considerations post-surgery and navigating the problems that may be encountered The importance of restoring range of motion, muscle strength and neuromuscular control to minimise the progression of degenerative joint disease
