The College of Animal Welfare was established in 1989 by one of the leading animal welfare charities, Wood Green Animal Shelters in Cambridgeshire. The vision was to use education to help tackle animal welfare issues and the problem of unwanted and abandoned animals.

In 1996, the College, known at the time as the Wood Green College of Animal Welfare, became an independently managed, not-for-profit, organisation in its own right and changed its name to The College of Animal Welfare.

Today, we have college centres around the UK, as well as a distance learning school, and specialise in training in the land-based sector.

We strongly believe that education and training is the key to raising standards of animal welfare. To this end, we strive to create new and accessible opportunities for learning, and encourage employers and those working with animals to undertake appropriate levels of training and continue with lifelong learning and education.



Our history

As the largest provider of veterinary nurse training in the UK, we can offer you the opportunity to study within a community of like-minded students and staff, who all share a common passion for animal welfare and a commitment to pushing forward what is already an exciting and rewarding profession.

Why veterinary nursing?

Gain real job prospects

Job prospects for registered veterinary nurses continue to remain high in veterinary practice and in related industries.

Salary prospects have improved significantly in recent years, the median salary package for qualified veterinary nurses is now £30,500 (SPVS Salaries Survey 2022/3).

Life-long learning

Continuing Professional Development (CPD) is a mandatory requirement for Registered Veterinary Nurses (RVNs), with 15 hours per year being required by the RCVS.

This gives those working in the profession the gift of life-long learning and education.

Varied career options

Upon completion of formal studies, veterinary nurses have numerous professional opportunities.

You could remain in first opinion practice; move into referral practice and specialise in a particular area, train as an equine veterinary nurse, or find work in related industries such as management, research, teaching, sales or rehabilitation with further training.

Rewarding profession

The sense of purpose that comes from nursing an ill, abandoned or stray animal back to health, makes veterinary nursing a rewarding and worthwhile career.

What's more - it can help you achieve the entry requirements needed to enrol onto training and education programmes, paving the way to future employment.



Check online job boards

Job boards such as the The College of Animal Welfare job board, Vet Times Jobs, Indeed or Animal Jobs Direct regularly list advertisements from veterinary organisations.



Contact animal organisations directly

Consider contacting organisations directly to introduce yourself and enquire about any work placement or employment opportunities.

Our Companion Animal Veterinary Nursing Diploma

This qualification will allow you to apply for professional registration as a Registered Veterinary Nurse (RVN) with the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS).

Assessment

You will undertake a variety of assessments including online examinations, assignments and case studies. You will also complete an online Nursing Progress Log (NPL). At the end of year two there is a formative practical assessment. Final practical examinations (OSCEs) are undertaken on successful completion of all other assessments at the end of your programme.

Entry requirements


You must have a minimum of 5 GCSEs at grades A*-C (or 9-4), including English Language, Mathematics and a Science subject.

Course content

Over the course of the qualification you will study 9 units:

- » Professional Veterinary Nursing Responsibilities
- » Diagnostic Principles
- » Principles of Veterinary Nursing Care 1 and 2
- » Pharmacology and Dispensary Management
- » Practical Veterinary Nursing Skills
- » Anaesthesia and Theatre Nursing Skills
- » Life Stage and Medical Nursing Care Support
- » Surgical Nursing and Patient Care

Embedded within this qualification is the content required for you to become a Suitably Qualified Person (SQP) for companion animals, allowing you to prescribe and/or supply certain veterinary medicinal products.



Level 3 Diploma in Veterinary Nursing – Companion Animal Pathway (VetSkill)

30–36 months

Students who are already employed in a veterinary practice must be at least 16 years of age, be working in an RCVS approved TP or aTP and have the full support of the practice to support them through the qualification.

Non-employed students must be a minimum of 18 years of age on the 1st of the month in which the course starts. Please note non-employed students who are 16 years of age or over and hold the Level 2 Diploma for Veterinary Care Assistants, the VetSkill Level 2 Certificate in Veterinary Care Support or the Veterinary Care Support (Level 2 Apprenticeship) qualification are able to apply.

Entry onto the programme is competitive. Work experience undertaken in a veterinary practice alongside a reference from a vet or registered veterinary nurse supporting your suitability for training will be an advantage. If you have not undertaken any work experience, we will consider your application, however you will be required to undertake work experience within the first three months of being on programme in order to make sure that this is the career for you.

Our Equine Veterinary Nursing Diploma

Study our equine veterinary nursing diploma and once you have successfully completed this course apply for professional registration as a Registered Veterinary Nurse with the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS)

Assessment

Assessments include online examinations, assignments, case studies and formal practical assessments. You will also complete an online Nursing Progress Log (NPL) over the course of your training. Final practical examinations (OSCEs) are undertaken at the end of your programme.

Entry requirements

You must have a minimum of 5 GCSEs at grades A*-C (or 9-4), including English Language, Mathematics and a Science. Students must be at least 16 years of age and employed in an equine or mixed (small animal and equine) veterinary practice approved by the RCVS as a Training Practice (TP) or Auxiliary Training Practice (aTP).

The qualification consists of a number of core units:

- » Diagnostic Principles
- » Equine Veterinary Nursing Care Principles
- » Supply of Veterinary Medicines
- » Practical Equine Veterinary Nursing Skills

- » Life Stage and Medical Nursing Care and Support
- » Surgical Nursing and Patient Care

Level 3 Diploma in Equine Veterinary Nursing (VetSkill)

30 months

Day release via Virtual Blended Delivery Classrooms. The majority of the theory element of the programme is delivered in virtual lecture format that allows you to engage with tutors and your peers in real time either from home or from work. All virtual classroom sessions are recorded and are available to view after the event for consolidation of learning and revision purposes.

Online exams are available via a remote invigilation platform as well as by physically attending one of our main centres.

Practical training sessions are held in-centre in the college environment; you will attend your chosen centre for practical training days (approximately 10) throughout your programme.

Our Apprenticeship in Companion Animal Veterinary Nursing

Assessment

Assessments including online examinations, assignments, case studies, Nursing Progress Log, practical assessment, and an End Point Assessment (EPA) including OSCE's and a Professional Discussion.

If you are required to undertake Functional Skills Level 2 in English and Maths, these are assessed via online examinations and practical assessments.

Entry requirements

You must have a minimum of five GCSEs at grade C or above (4-9), including English Language, Mathematics and a Science subject, and be living and working in England in an RCVS approved Training Practice (TP or aTP) earning at least the National Minimum Wage for Apprentices.

Course content

Over the course of the qualification you will study 9 units:

- » Professional Veterinary Nursing Responsibilities
- » Diagnostic Principles
- » Principles of Veterinary Nursing Care 1 and 2
- » Pharmacology and Dispensary Management
- » Practical Veterinary Nursing Skills

Veterinary Nurse (Level 3) Apprenticeship – Companion Animal

30–36 months

As a veterinary nurse apprentice, you will be employed in a veterinary practice, earning a wage, and gaining vital practical skills and experience. This small animal qualification will cover the following species – Cats, Dogs, Rabbits and Guinea Pigs. You will study on a day release basis and have access to your course materials via our online Virtual Learning Environment (VLE).

On completion of your apprenticeship you will be eligible to apply to join the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons' (RCVS) Register of Veterinary Nurses and use the post nominal term, RVN. Entry on the register allows you to legally practice as a veterinary nurse under the direction of a veterinary surgeon.

Entry requirements

You must have a minimum of 5 GCSEs at grades A*-C (or 9-4), including English Language, Mathematics and a Science subject. If you do not meet these requirements, there are alternative qualifications that may be acceptable. You will need to be living and working in England in an equine or mixed (equine and small animal) RCVS approved Training Practice (TP or aTP) earning at least the National Minimum Wage for Apprentices.

Assessment

Assessments will include examinations assignments/case studies, Nursing Progress Log, practical assessments, and the End Point Assessment (EPA). The EPA consists of a Professional Discussion and an equine OSCE. Functional Skills will be assessed via online examinations and practical assessments if required.

Veterinary Nurse (Level 3) Apprenticeship - Equine

30–36 months

As an apprentice veterinary nurse undergoing the equine pathway, you will be employed in an equine or mixed (equine and small animal) veterinary practice, earning a wage, and gaining vital practical skills and experience.

As part of this apprenticeship you will also receive the Level 3 Diploma in Equine Veterinary Nursing qualification and be eligible to apply for professional registration with the RCVS.

The FdSc Veterinary Nursing Programme

Entry requirements

Application rates for this course are high, and offers for a place are competitive. A list of acceptable entry requirements (both academic and work experience) can be found on the Royal Veterinary College's website.

Assessment

In order to complete the foundation degree, you will be required to pass all of the University's practical and written assessments and examinations.

Throughout the course you will undertake a number of units:

Clinical practice is a significant element of the course, and will be experienced in between your theory blocks. Your placements will be arranged for you in RCVS approved Training Practices by The College of Animal Welfare's placement liaison team. You will have the opportunity to train at a range of veterinary practices, including the Royal Veterinary College's own world-leading hospitals, giving you hands-on experience and a real insight into the day-to-day role of a vet nurse.



FdSc Veterinary Nursing (Royal Veterinary College)

3 years full time

This three year, full time, programme - delivered and awarded by the Royal Veterinary College (University of London) in partnership with The College of Animal Welfare - allows graduates to apply to join the RCVS Register of Veterinary Nurses. It provides the unique opportunity to study veterinary nursing at the UK's oldest veterinary school, and to be taught by world renowned clinicians.

Graduates of the Royal Veterinary College's Foundation Degree in Veterinary Nursing are able to apply to join the RCVS Register of Veterinary Nurses. Following the submission of the registration form and fee, successful applicants will then be entitled to call themselves a Registered Veterinary Nurse (RVN) and use the post nominal term, RVN, after their name.

Our Veterinary Care Qualifications

Veterinary care assistants are important members of today's modern veterinary team. They work alongside veterinary surgeons and veterinary nurses to provide vital nursing care, ensuring that the well-being of small animal patients is paramount.

Entry requirements

There are no formal academic entry requirements, however you must be competent in reading, writing and speaking the English language as all course materials and assessments are delivered in English.

You must be volunteering or employed within a clinical role in a veterinary practice for a minimum of 10 hours per week for the full duration of your course. You may be asked to provide a reference from a veterinary surgeon or veterinary nurse supporting your application and confirming you have completed a minimum of three months of regular employed or voluntary work prior to starting the programme. You require a dedicated mentor agreed within your practice.

Course content

These courses cover the key skills and knowledge needed to provide a good level of support to the veterinary team, covering subjects such as:

- » Legislation and Safe Working Practices
- » Animal Health and Welfare
- » Animal Environment and Accommodation
- » Introduction to Patient Care
- » Introduction to Animal Anatomy and Physiology
- » Veterinary Care Support
- » Principles and Practices of Administrative Duties

Assessment

Assessment varies across the two courses, including methods such as: a portfolio of evidence, written and practical assignments and online multi choice question tests.



Level 2 Certificate in Veterinary Care Support

12 months

This qualification is designed for those working in a veterinary care support role. During the programme you will learn the relevant practical skills and underpinning knowledge needed to provide a good level of support to the veterinary nurses and veterinary surgeon.

City & Guilds Level 2 Diploma for Veterinary Care Assistants

12 - 18 months

This online, distance learning course is ideal for those working or volunteering in a veterinary environment assisting veterinary surgeons and veterinary nurses with the care of small animal patients.

Our Veterinary Care Apprenticeship

As a veterinary care apprentice you will work in a veterinary environment providing supportive care to small animal patients and supporting the veterinary team. You will gain practical on-the-job skills whilst studying for your apprenticeship via online distance learning.

Key Facts

- ✓ Start at any time
- ✓ No college attendance
- ✓ 6 hrs OTJ training per week
- ✓ Web based tutor support

Entry requirements

There are no formal academic entry requirements. However, you will need to be living and working in England within a clinical role in a veterinary environment and earning at least the National Minimum Wage for Apprentices.

Assessment

Methods include: a portfolio of evidence and an End Point Assessment consisting of a practical assessment and professional discussion. You will undertake Functional Skills Level 1 and 2 in English and Maths unless exempt.

Course content

The apprenticeships cover key skills, knowledge and behaviours needed to thrive in a veterinary support role, such as:

- » UK and EU Animal related legislation
- » Basic Anatomy and Physiology
- » The behaviours of the animal, applicable to species and how it impacts care and welfare
- » The Importance of human and animal bond
- » Maintain hygiene, bio security procedures and infection controls
- » Respond to animal first aid, urgent, ongoing and preventive care requirements
- » Safe working, work ethic, responsibility, team work, communication and professionalism.

Veterinary Care Support: Level 2 Apprenticeship (Animal Care and Welfare Assistant)

12 – 18 months

Veterinary Care Support (VCS) professionals are essential members of today's modern veterinary practice, working alongside veterinary surgeons and veterinary nurses to provide vital nursing care to small animal patients. A hugely varied role, there are no days the same.

You will be employed in a veterinary practice gaining vital practical skills and experience, and earning a wage alongside studying your formal apprenticeship qualification.

Qualifications for Assisting with Monitoring of Companion Animal Patients

Key Facts

- ✓ Start at any time
- ✓ No college attendance
- ✓ Study in the UK or overseas
- ✓ Distance learning tutor support

Entry requirements

There are no formal academic entry requirements. However, your application must be endorsed by your Practice Principal – who must be a veterinary surgeon (MRCVS). You must be employed, or volunteering, in a veterinary practice and have been in such a position for a minimum of six months prior to starting the course.

Assessment

You will be required to complete a series of case studies, keep an online log of your work (a minimum of 200 hours of anaesthetic monitoring), and pass an online multiple choice examination by attending an exam centre.

Course content

Over the course of the qualification you will study:

- » The preparation for, and induction of, veterinary sedation and anaesthesia
- » The principles of sedation and anaesthesia in animals
- » How to safely assist in the provision of veterinary sedation and anaesthesia procedures under direct supervision of a veterinary surgeon
- » Preparing and care of equipment used for veterinary sedation and anaesthesia under the supervision of a veterinary surgeon
- » The principles of the identification of, and possible responses to, anaesthetic complications and emergencies

City & Guilds Level 2 Certificate in Assisting Veterinary Surgeons in the Monitoring of Animal Patients Under Anaesthesia and Sedation

12 months

Developed in partnership with Lantra and with support from the Society of Practising Veterinary Surgeons (SPVS), this City & Guilds qualification is ideal for lay staff or VCAs involved in assisting veterinary surgeons with the monitoring of companion animals under anaesthesia and sedation.

Whilst it is recognised that the monitoring of anaesthesia of companion animals is best carried out by a qualified veterinary surgeon or veterinary nurse, this is not always possible in every circumstance. It is therefore important that lay staff, who may be called upon to assist, are equipped with the necessary knowledge and skills needed to do so in a safe, professional manner.

You must be 16 years of age or over and have basic literacy and numeracy skills. Employment or work experience within a Veterinary Medicines Directorate (VMD) registered premises, a veterinary practice registered with the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons (RCVS), or a retail pharmacy registered with the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhC) may be beneficial in assisting in preparation towards the final assessment but is not essential.

Assessment

You will be assessed by completing two multiple choice question (MCQ) online exams and an online, scenario-based professional discussion.

Course content

On completion of this qualification you will have achieved the following units:

- » Legislation and SQP Status for the Supply of Veterinary Medicines
- » Companion Animal Health for the SQP
- » Prescribing and Supplying Veterinary Medicines for Companion Animals

A Suitably Qualified Person (SQP) is an animal medicine advisor who is qualified to prescribe and/or supply certain veterinary medicines under the Veterinary Medicines Regulations.



VetSkill VTEC Level 4 Award for Animal Medicines Advisors (SQP - Companion Animal)

6 months

This qualification is designed for those looking to gain the necessary qualification to be able to prescribe and supply veterinary medicine classes POM-VPS and/or NFA-VPS to companion animals. You may be working in veterinary practice, or in a Suitably Qualified Persons (SQP) retailer approved to retail and supply VPS medicines.

It is intended to provide relevant SQP competencies and underpinning knowledge and understanding that will enable prescription of medicines that fall under the POM-VPS and NFA-VPS categories within the companion animal group. Additionally, you will develop a broad understanding of animal health and disease, and the skills to identify parasite infestations and select appropriate medicines to prescribe.

Entry requirements

There are no formal academic entry requirements; however you should have a sound level of numeracy, literacy and ICT skills.

You will need to be working, or volunteering, on reception in a veterinary practice, for a minimum of 8 hours per week, and have done so for at least three months before applying.

You must have the full support of your practice and will need to have a mentor in place within practice to assist you with parts of your course.

If you are volunteering, you may be asked to provide a reference from a practice manager, head receptionist, veterinary surgeon or veterinary nurse supporting your application.

Course content

Over the course of the qualification you will cover the following units:

- » Assisting with the supply of veterinary products
- » Maintenance of a veterinary reception area
- » Principles and practice of veterinary reception
- » Working safely in a veterinary practice
- » Essentials of veterinary terminology

Assessment

You will complete an online portfolio and undertake a short, multiple choice question, examination. You will be required to attend one of our centres (Huntingdon, North London, Leeds or Edinburgh) to undertake your final examination. If you do not have access to a CAW centre, the examination can be carried out via remote invigilation.

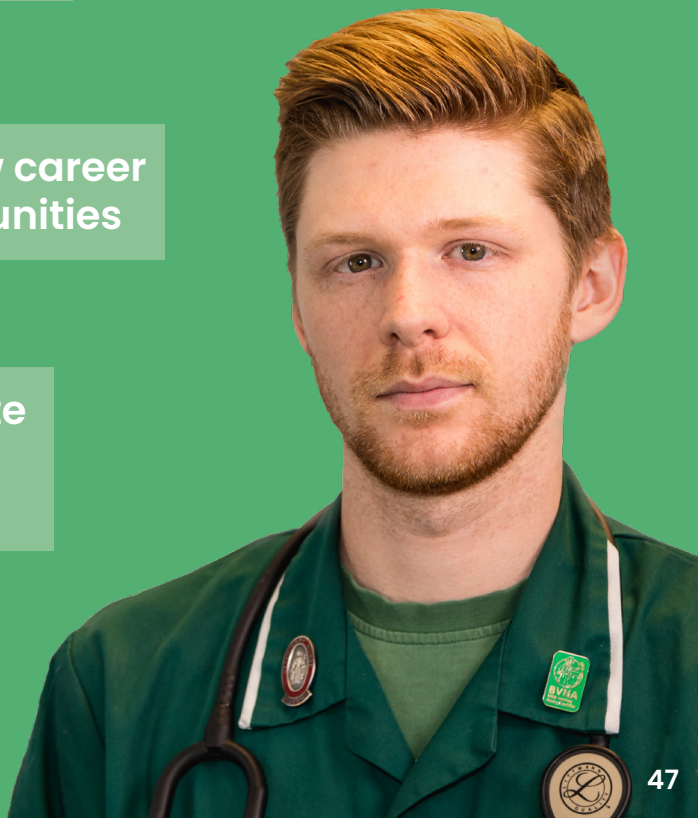

Fees and Finance

Pay as You Learn

Our 'Pay As You Learn' scheme allows The College of Animal Welfare students the option to pay course fees (excluding professional or awarding body fees) on a monthly basis.

Professional and awarding body fees are payable in full before the commencement of the course.

Advanced Learner Loan

CAW Loans2Learn Scheme

The loan can be used to fully or partially cover your course fees (but does not cover any awarding body fees, such as enrolment and examination fees). The loan works in a similar way to a bank loan, and it is not provided from the ESFA or any other government department, and is not related to any student finance.

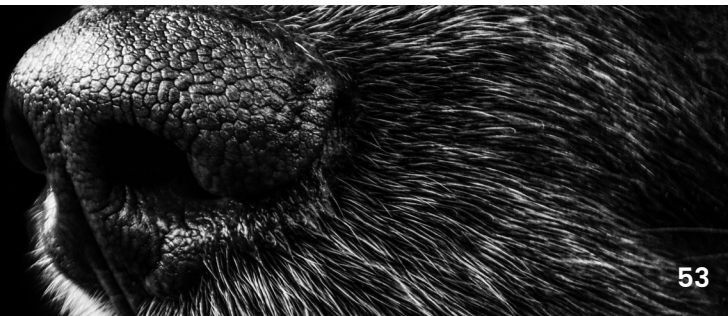
